

## **MINIATURAS: MAPAS CELESTES**

Persian miniatures have been celebrated as one of the finest forms of visual art, depicting scenes from history and mythology, capturing the essence of the way of life.

Persian miniatures date back to the 13th century and respond to the intersection of technology and human creativity to transmit complex narratives. As time passed, the artistic form evolved, incorporating, and combining different techniques and styles. If we continue to the present day, we arrive to another intersection of technology and art: the rise of generative systems in contemporary art.

Generative art is a form of computer-created expression that uses algorithms to create unique images. These images can range from simple geometric shapes to complex and abstract compositions, allowing us to create works impossible to achieve through traditional means and leading us to a digitalized artistic expression, which focuses on principles of temporal representation, authenticity, intention, memetic design, and time compressing.

The device creates images that evoke memories, whether happy, sad, or violent, seeking to discover previously unexplored iconic dreams. The artists explore the idea of artificial memory, a memory created from human history. They aspire to generate memories with alternative temporal references and new public dreams to connect with the past and the future through imagination. This recreation of alternative times aims to offer a new perspective on the present, future, and past at the push of a button.
